IISD Reporting Services is seeking funding to support the writing and publishing of the *Earth Negotiations Bulletin (ENB)* at the 13th session of the UN Forum on Forests (UNFF13) scheduled to take place from 7-11 May 2018 in New York City.

This funding request is in addition to our funding request to support publishing the *Earth Negotiations Bulletin* between 1 April 2018 and 31 March 2019, which has been circulated to donors but has not generated sufficient funding for coverage of this specific meeting.

## IISD Reporting Services and the ENB: the issue and its importance

Representation and participation in decision-making requires access to information about the issues under discussion as well as knowledge about the process and context in which decisions are made. Informed decision-making contributes to better outcomes, and transparency builds in accountability and better implementation. Those involved in multilateral negotiations on environment and sustainable development issues need to access

and analyze the information required to inform and influence decision-making processes. This is particularly challenging for both developed and developing countries in the rapidly evolving and expanding number of activities related to such negotiations. Trusted curators of knowledge are therefore increasingly important.

Since the 1992 Rio Earth Summit, IISD RS's Earth Negotiations Bulletin (ENB) has filled this critical need by increasing transparency and providing objective and comprehensive reporting on multilateral negotiations on environment and sustainable development issues, thus enabling government delegations and other stakeholders to engage more fully in the decision-making process. In particular, the ENB benefits developing countries, some of whom face severe financial constraints in sending delegates to meetings, by providing a neutral and trusted source of information and analysis so that they are able to engage and participate effectively in the decision-making process.

We distribute our daily reports in hard copy at meeting venues, on our website, by email, on Facebook and via Twitter (@IISDRS). At the conclusion of each meeting, ENB publishes a 10,000–30,000-word summary and analysis of the meeting.

Many UN delegates, ministers and other governmental officials, non-governmental organizations, the business community, the academic community, the media and UN staff who track environment and sustainable development negotiations consider the ENB to be essential reading. The ENB has received high praise for its objective and comprehensive presentation of MEA negotiations.

### SUMMARY OF THE 44TH SESSION OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL PANEL ON CLIMATE CHANGE: 17-21 OCTOBER 2016

The 44th session of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC-44) convened from 17-21 October 2016, in Bangkok, Thailand, and brought together over 300 participants from 109 countries.

The IPCC has three Working Groups (WGs): Working Group I (WGI) addresses the physical science basis of climate change; Working Group II (WGII) addresses climate change impacts, adaptation and vulnerability; and Working Group III (WGIII) addresses options for limiting GHG emissions and mitigating climate change. Each WG has two Co-Chairs and six Vice-Chairs, except for the fifth assessment cycle when WGIII had three Co-Chairs. The Co-Chairs guide the WGs in fulfilling the mandates given to them by the Panel and are assisted in this task

## History of IISD Reporting Services Coverage of the Forest Process

IISD Reporting Services has been following international forest policy processes since the 1990s, and has consistently provided coverage and analysis of all previous sessions of the UNFF, including negotiations of the four global objectives on forests, the NLBI and discussions leading up to the adoption of a decision on means of implementation for sustainable forest management. IISD RS has also covered several ad hoc expert group meetings in support of the UNFF, as well as country-led initiatives, such as the workshop on Forest Governance, Decentralization and REDD+ in Latin America and the Caribbean.

The 13th session of the UN Forum on Forests (UNFF 13) is scheduled to take place 7-11 May 2018 and New York City. Participants are expected to address implementation of the Strategic Plan and the Quadrennial Programme of Work, and means of implementation for sustainable forest management (SFM). A meeting in February 2018 titled *Working Across Sectors to Halt Deforestation and Increase Forest Area: From Aspiration to Action* will provide input to UNFF 13 on SDG target 15.2. UNFF 13 will in turn provide input to the 2018 session of the High-level Political Forum (HLPF 2018), particularly its consideration of SDG 15.

Having provided an accurate reflection, as well as an analysis of the proceedings on such politically sensitive negotiations, IISD Reporting Services have contributed to the transparency of the negotiations and to awareness regarding international forestry issues, and would wish to continue contributing towards that direction through coverage of all future sessions of the UNFF and related expert meetings.

- ✓ provide real-time information to environment and development decision-makers using new and emerging information technologies;
- ✓ contribute to the academic body of knowledge about this meeting; *and*
- ✓ maintain a trusted information flow to policy-makers on the activities of related negotiating processes.

## Budget, Funding Status and Proposed Outputs

The budget for the production of the *Earth Negotiations Bulletin* from UNFF 13 is estimated at USD 43,000 and presented in the below table. This meeting budget includes the following items: daily fees for each team member; travel to and from the

**THE EARTH NEGOTIATIONS BULLETIN (daily & summary written reporting):** ENB is a one-page, double-sided publication that is published and distributed to participants at selected UN environment and sustainable development negotiations and also disseminated via email, our website ([enb.iisd.org](http://enb.iisd.org)), Facebook and Twitter. The readership of ENB is estimated at 100,000+ people worldwide.

IISD RS proposes to publish daily reports and a summary issue of the ENB from this meeting. The summary issue will synthesize the outcomes of the meeting and be published within 48 hours of its conclusion, and also posted and archived on our website and delivered through our email lists, Facebook and Twitter.

If IISD RS receives funding for a Digital Editor, the *Earth Negotiations Bulletin* team will provide digital coverage of this meeting on our website, including digital photos and links to official documents and other related websites.

## Support IISD Reporting Services Coverage

Over the last twenty-five years, IISD RS has raised funds from more than forty donors. Initial funding in 1992 came from the Ford Foundation, Compton Foundation, W. Alton Jones Foundation, the Mott Foundation, the Swedish Ministry of the Environment, the Norwegian Ministry of the Environment, the World Bank, GREENWIRE, the Jenifer Altman Foundation, the Canadian Purple Martin Fund and WWF. 
