IISD Reporting Services is seeking funding to support the writing and publishing of the Earth Negotiations Bulletin (ENB) at the:

- Third meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Nagoya Protocol on Access and Benefit-sharing (ABS COP-MOP 3);
- Ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (Cartagena COP-MOP 9); and
- Fourteenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD COP 14).

These meetings are scheduled to take place from 10-22 November 2018 in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt, with the preceding High Level Segment of the fourteenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties scheduled for 7-8 November 2018.

We would also like to provide a daily wrap video of the main negotiations and daily issues of side events (ENB on the Side – ENBOTS) and therefore also seek additional funding for those activities. ## IISD Reporting Services and the ENB: the issue and its importance

Representation and participation in decision-making requires access to information about the issues under discussion as well as knowledge about the process and context in which decisions are made. Informed decision-making contributes to better outcomes, and transparency builds in accountability and better implementation. Those involved in multilateral negotiations on environment and sustainable development issues need to access

and analyze the information required to inform and influence decision-making processes. This is particularly challenging for both developed and developing countries in the rapidly evolving and expanding number of activities related to such negotiations. Trusted curators of knowledge are therefore increasingly important.

Since the 1992 Rio Earth Summit, IISD RS's Earth Negotiations Bulletin (ENB) has filled this critical need by increasing transparency and providing objective and comprehensive reporting on multilateral negotiations on environment and sustainable development issues, thus enabling government delegations and other stakeholders to engage more fully in the decision-making process. In particular, the ENB benefits developing countries, some of whom face severe financial constraints in sending delegates to meetings, by providing a neutral and trusted source of information and analysis so that they are able to engage and participate effectively in the decision-making process.

We distribute our daily reports in hard copy at meeting venues, on our website, by email, on Facebook and via Twitter (@IISDRS). At the conclusion of each meeting, ENB publishes a 10,000–30,000-word summary and analysis of the meeting.

Many UN delegates, ministers and other governmental officials, non-governmental organizations, the business community, the academic community, the media and UN staff who track environment and sustainable development negotiations consider the ENB to be essential reading. The ENB has received high praise for its objective and comprehensive presentation of MEA negotiations.

### SUMMARY OF THE 44TH SESSION OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL PANEL ON CLIMATE CHANGE: 17-21 OCTOBER 2016

The 44th session of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC-44) convened from 17-21 October 2016, in Bangkok, Thailand, and brought together over 300 participants from 109 countries.

The IPCC has three Working Groups (WGs): Working Group I (WGI) addresses the physical science basis of climate change; Working Group II (WGII) addresses climate change impacts, adaptation and vulnerability; and Working Group III (WGIII) addresses options for limiting GHG emissions and mitigating climate change. Each WG has two Co-Chairs and six Vice-Chairs, except for the fifth assessment cycle when WGIII had three Co-Chairs. The Co-Chairs guide the WGs in fulfilling the mandates given to them by the Panel and are assisted in this task

## History of IISD Reporting Services Coverage of the Convention on Biological Diversity, Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety, and the Nagoya Protocol

The fourteenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD COP 14), the ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (Biosafety COP-MOP 8), and the third meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Nagoya Protocol on Access and Benefit-sharing (ABS COP-MOP 3), will be held back-to-back, in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt from 10-22 November 2018.

IISD Reporting Services has been consistently providing coverage of CBD meetings from the first session of the Intergovernmental Committee on the CBD (October 1993, Geneva, Switzerland), including all meetings of the Conference of the Parties and intersessional meetings of the Convention’s subsidiary bodies, including the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice (SBSTTA), and the Working Groups on ABS, Article 8(j) (traditional knowledge), protected areas and review of implementation. IISD Reporting Services has also covered the entire negotiation process leading to the adoption of the Biosafety Protocol, as well as meetings following its adoption, including under the Intergovernmental Committee for the Cartagena Protocol (ICCP), all subsequent meetings of the COP/MOP and meetings of the Working Group on liability and redress and the Group of the Friends of the Co-Chairs on liability and redress. Particularly during the 2008-2010 biennium IISD Reporting Services have provided daily coverage at all intersessional meetings of the subsidiary bodies under the Convention and the Protocol as well as several informal meetings on ABS and liability and redress. Additionally, IISD Reporting Services has covered the entire negotiation process leading to the adoption of the Nagoya Protocol on Access and Benefit Sharing and the subsequent meetings of the ICNP and COP-MOP.

As a result, IISD Reporting Services has witnessed, and consistently reported on, all important developments under the CBD and its Biosafety Protocol, as well as related high-level events and processes outside the CBD framework, such as the 2002 World Summit on Sustainable Development and meetings of the UNEP Governing Council. The team has consistently followed CBD and biosafety negotiations providing daily reports, summaries and analyses, and has built an outstanding institutional memory for international negotiations on biodiversity issues. Having provided an accurate reflection, as well as an analysis of the proceedings on the large range of often technically challenging and politically sensitive negotiations carried out under the CBD, IISD Reporting Services have contributed to the transparency of the negotiations and to awareness regarding global efforts to achieve the CBD’s three objectives, namely conserve biodiversity, use it sustainably and share equitably the benefits arising from the use of genetic resources.

Having provided an accurate reflection, as well as an analysis of the proceedings on such politically sensitive negotiations, IISD Reporting Services has contributed to the transparency of the negotiations and to awareness regarding international biodiversity issues, and would wish to continue contributing towards that direction through coverage of all future sessions of the CBD and related expert meetings.

### Purpose of this Funding Request

We would wish to continue contributing towards disseminating information from these meetings, documenting the evolution of discussions as policymakers consider their work to date and chart their next steps.

At these upcoming negotiations in December 2018, IISD’s Reporting Services proposes to:

- ✓ raise awareness within the international policy community and media of the outcomes from this meeting;
- ✓ create a level information playing-field at the meeting;
- ✓ contribute to transparency in international negotiations;
- ✓ provide useful information to policy-makers and those interested in contributing to the policy development process;
- ✓ disseminate information on the activities of governments, NGOs and the United Nations at this international meeting;
- ✓ provide real-time information to environment and development decision-makers using new and emerging information technologies;
- ✓ contribute to the academic body of knowledge about this meeting; *and*
- ✓ maintain a trusted information flow to policy-makers on the activities of related negotiating processes.

## Budget, Funding Status and Proposed Outputs

The budget for the production of proposed activities (ENB, ENV, ENBOTS) from CBD COP 14, Biosafety COP-MOP 9 and ABS COP-MOP 3 is estimated at USD 297,033 and presented in the below table. This budget includes the following items: daily fees for each team member; travel to and from the meeting, and food and lodging (DSA); publishing and distribution costs of the hard copy and online daily and summary issues; office and production supplies; communication costs; and allocated costs.

**THE EARTH NEGOTIATIONS BULLETIN (daily & summary written reporting):** ENB is a one-page, double-sided publication that is published and distributed to participants at selected UN environment and sustainable development negotiations and also disseminated via email, our website ([enb.iisd.org](http://enb.iisd.org)), Facebook and Twitter. The readership of ENB is estimated at 100,000+ people worldwide.

IISD RS proposes to publish daily reports and a summary issue of the ENB from this meeting. The summary issue will synthesize the outcomes of the meeting and be published within 48 hours of its conclusion, and also posted and archived on our website and delivered through our email lists, Facebook and Twitter.

If IISD RS receives funding for a Digital Editor, the *Earth Negotiations Bulletin* team will provide digital coverage of this meeting on our website, including digital photos and links to official documents and other related websites.

**TRANSLATIONS:** IISD is able to translate ENB reports from this meeting into French, Spanish, Japanese and Arabic. If IISD receives funding to do so, translations of the daily reports will be disseminated alongside the English versions. Translated summary versions will be posted to the meeting website no more than two weeks after the meeting has concluded. If you

**ENB ON THE SIDE (ENBOTS):** If IISD RS receives funding to provide written coverage of side events, the *ENBOTS* team will publish daily issues reporting on activities and discussions from selected side events. The daily issue of the side events coverage will be posted on our website, including digital photos and links to related documents and websites.

**ENB DAILY WRAP VIDEO:** If IISD RS receives funding to provide video coverage of the main negotiations, the ENB video team will produce short videos (max. of 3 minutes) daily depicting the day's discussions and highlights, and could include interviews with selected individuals. These videos will be published on our website.

## Support IISD Reporting Services


