### UNDESA, UNDOALOS ORGANIZE EXPERT PANEL ON OCEAN ACIDIFICATION

An Expert Panel on Ocean Acidification convened at UN Headquarters in New York, US, on 3 September 2009. The event was organized by the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs, the UN Division for Ocean Affairs and the Law of the Sea (UNDOALOS), and the UN Foundation. The meeting aimed to increase awareness and highlight options to avoid adverse impacts of ocean acidification on marine life and ecosystems by bringing together key stakeholders. The panel included senior officials and experts, and the panel's presentations were followed by an interactive discussion focused on potential international cooperation, possible policies and actions by the international community, and steps to raise public awareness (http://www.iisd.ca/ymb/oceans/epoa/).

#### SPECIAL MEETING REPORT (cont.)

which policy-makers and society will be able to assess their achievements, and identify suitable responses, is largely dependent upon the information provided by such indicators.

In July 2009, the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity (SCBD) and the UN Environment Programme-World Conservation Monitoring Centre (UNEP-WCMC) jointly convened a meeting to review the use and effectiveness of the 2010 biodiversity indicators and to consider the implications for the development of post-2010 targets and indicators. The meeting was hosted by the UK Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra), whilst additional financial support was provided by UNEP, the European Commission (EC) and the UK Joint Nature Conservation Committee (JNCC). The workshop brought together over 70 participants including governmentnominated experts and representatives of biodiversity-related conventions, UN agencies, academic and research institutions and other relevant international, intergovernmental and nongovernmental organizations.

The meeting crafted a series of recommendations, of which the following were voted the most important:

A. A small set (10-15) of broad headline indicators, clearly linked to

the main target and sub-targets and underscored by more specific sub-indicators/measures, should be maintained/developed, in order to communicate the indicator set through key storylines and clear, policy relevant messages, while maintaining a flexible framework to cater for national/regional needs.

- B. The current framework of global indicators should be modified and simplified into four 'focal areas': Threats to Biodiversity; State of Biodiversity; Ecosystem services; and Policy Responses. Existing indicators should be re-aligned with the new framework, as appropriate, in order to maintain continuity and enhance their use. The relationships between the focal areas and between indicators and targets should be clearly explained and documented, including their scientific basis and assumptions.
- C. Some additional measures on threats to biodiversity, status of diversity, ecosystem extent and condition, ecosystem services and policy responses should be developed to provide a more complete and flexible set of indicators to monitor progress towards a post-2010 target and to clearly link actions and biodiversity outcomes to benefits for people.
- D. National capacity for framework application, indicator development, data collection and information man-

agement should be further developed and properly resourced in order to strengthen countries' ability to develop, monitor and communicate indicators in a participatory, sustained and integrated way; and to link with other processes e.g., MEAs at all levels.

- E. Priority must be given to developing a communication strategy for the post-2010 targets and indicators in order to inform policy discussions and ensure effective communication of messages coming from the indicators into all sectors (including delivering stories relevant to human well-being, identifying champions, promoting a regular reporting process, etc).
- F. A flexible and inclusive process/partnership for post-2010 indicator development should be maintained and adequately resourced in order to increase collaboration in the development, quality control, implementation and communication of indicators at all levels, including the sharing of experience and the building of capacity.

# ASSESSMENT OF ASSESSMENTS LAUNCHED

The Expert Group of the UN Environment Programme (UNEP) and the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO (IOC-UNESCO) launched the "Assessment of Assessments" report, a comprehensive overview of the marine assessment landscape that also considers socio-economic factors. The 31 August 2009 launch at UN Headquarters, in New York, US, took place during the meeting of the Ad Hoc Working Group of the Whole, a meeting established through UN General Assembly Resolution 63/111, in order to recommend a course of action to the General Assembly at its 64th session. The Group presented a set of options and recommendations for governments to consider on ways to move the envisioned "Regular Process" forward. If established, the Regular Process for the reporting and assessment of the state of the marine environment will "serve as the mechanism to keep the world's

oceans and seas under continuing review by providing regular assessments at global and supra-regional levels." The Group also presented the proposed relationship of the "Regular Process" to the UN at the intergovernmental level; and the establishment of a management oversight body; a new expert group; secretariat support mechanisms; and a set of financing options that could average between US\$4 million and US\$5.6 million a year (http://www.eurocean.org/np4/1200.html).

## NEW RAMSAR SITES DESIGNATED

New Ramsar sites have been designated in Chile, Kazakhstan, the UK Overseas Territory of St Helena, Tristan da Cunha and China. In Chile, two high altitude Wetlands of International Importance were designated and are both centered on saline lakes that are important for Western Hemisphere migratory birds and also support populations of mammals. Kazakhstan named two arid

steppe lake systems in the Kostanay Oblast. The United Kingdom has designated two new, large marine areas in its Overseas Territory of St Helena, Tristan da Cunha in the South Atlantic Ocean. The new sites are centered on Gough Island and Inaccessible Island, respectively, with surrounding waters. China designated its 37th Wetland of International Importance, Hangzhou Xixi Wetlands, an important site for nine threatened species of birds (http://www.ramsar.org/cda/ramsar/display/main/main.jsp?zn=r amsar&cp=1-26\_4000\_0\_\_).

#### TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT **REPORT 2009**

(UNCTAD, 2009) The Trade and Development Report 2009, by the UN Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), addresses how to respond to the global economic crisis and the role of climate change mitigation in development. The report suggests that innovation in support of climate change mitigation is not fundamentally different from other innovation activities, but since climate change mitigation is increasingly recognized as a public good, innovation also calls for direct government intervention (http://www.unctad.org/ Templates/webflyer.asp?intDocItemI D=17957&docid=11867&intItemID =2068&lang=1&mode=press).

#### INVESTING IN LAND STEW-ARDSHIP: GEF'S EFFORTS TO COMBAT LAND DEGRADA-TION AND DESERTIFICATION **GLOBALLY**

(GEF, 2009) This booklet describes the Global Environment Facility's (GEF) activities to combat land degradation and desertification. The booklet contains several examples of projects in this thematic area and notes synergies in combating climate change. Land degradation affects more than 33% of the planet's surface area, leading to deterioration of ecosystem services and negative consequences for 2.6 billion people in more than 100 countries. The goal of the focal area strategy is to contribute to arresting and reversing current global trends in land degradation, specifically desertification and deforestation (http://gefweb.org/uploadedFiles/Publications/Investingland-degradation-English.pdf).

#### OZONE DAY CELEBRATED, SUMMARY OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING POSTED

In the lead up to International Ozone Day, celebrated on 16 September, the Ozone Secretariat has produced six posters to raise public awareness about the ozone layer. celebration, the UN Environment Programme, together with UN Development Programme, UN Industrial Development Organization and others, have produced a documentary that examines the challenges faced in trying to phase-out HCFCs, a coolant

gas used in air conditioners that is the main ozone depleting substance that also contributes to climate change. The

In other news, a post-meeting summary of the meeting of the 58th Executive Committee to the Montreal Protocol, which convened from 6-10 July 2009, in Montreal, Canada, has been released. The Executive Committee approved 63 investment projects and work programme activities with a value of just over US\$17.94 million, plus US\$1.41 million in support costs for bilateral/implementing agencies, and took a total of 40 decisions (http:// www.uneptie.org/ozonAction/information/mmcfiles/6300-e-58excom09.pdf).

#### **▶ CLIMATE AND ATMOSPHERE**

#### KYOTO PROTOCOL COMPLIANCE COMMITTEE TO MEET

The sixth meeting of the plenary of the Compliance Committee of the Kyoto Protocol will convene in Bangkok, Thailand, from 12-15 October 2009. This meeting will be preceded by the seventh meeting of the enforcement branch, which will take place from 11-12 October 2009, and the seventh meeting of the facilitative branch, which will take place on 12 October 2009.

In other UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) news, the Secretariat has released a Scenario Note (FCCC/KP/AWG/2009/13) in preparation for the first part of the ninth session of the *Ad Hoc* Working Group on Further Commitments for Annex I Parties under the Kyoto Protocol (AWG-KP 9). The seventh session of the *Ad Hoc* Working Group on Long-term Cooperative Action under the Convention (AWG- LCA 7) and AWG-KP 9 are scheduled to take place from 28 September-9 October 2009 in Bangkok, Thailand (http://unfccc.int/resource/docs/2009/awg9/eng/13.pdf).

The Executive Board of the Clean Development Mechanism (CDM) held

its 49th meeting, from 8-11 September 2009, at the UN Campus in Bonn, Germany. The Board discussed matters relating to the operation of the CDM, including: the CDM programme of activities; registration of CDM projects; issuance of certified emission reductions and the CDM registry; accreditation of designated operational entities; methodologies for baselines and monitoring plans; and the CDM management plan and resources for work on the CDM (http://cdm.unfccc.int/EB/049/index. html).

The 17th meeting of the Joint Implementation Supervisory Committee (JISC) convened from 10-11 September 2009, in Kiev, Ukraine. At the meeting, participants considered various issues necessary for the functioning of JI. JISC 17 was preceded by informal consultations on 7 September, and a UNFCCC JI technical workshop on 8-9 September. (http://ji.unfccc.int/Sup\_Committee/Meetings/017/index.html). The Adaptation Fund Board meeting was also held in Bonn, Germany, from 14-16 September 2009 (http://www.adaptation-fund.org/afbb7documents.html).

Looking ahead to the 31st meetings of the UNFCCC's subsidiary bodies, the UNFCCC Secretariat has released an advance version of the provisional agenda (FCCC/SBSTA/2009/4) for the 31st session of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA 31). This meeting is scheduled to coincide with the 15th session of the Conference of the Parties (COP 15) to the UNFCCC and fifth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto

Protocol (COP/MOP 5) from 7-18 December 2009 in Copenhagen, Denmark. The document is intended to assist delegations in preparing for the session. The exact dates within the session have yet to be confirmed (http://unfccc.int/resource/docs/2009/sbsta/eng/04.pdf).

In other news, the UNFCCC Secretariat has published a summary (FCCC/SBSTA/2009/5) of the technical workshop on integrating practices, tools and systems for climate risk assessment and management and disaster risk reduction strategies into national policies and programmes, held under the Nairobi Work Programme on impacts, vulnerability and adaptation to climate change. The workshop took place in Havana, Cuba, from 10-12 March 2009 (http://unfccc.int/resource/docs/2009/sbsta/eng/05.pdf).

The UNFCCC Secretariat has also launched the 2009 Clean Development Mechanism (CDM) International Photo and Video Contests, under the theme "CDM Changing Lives." The purpose of the contests is to raise awareness of the CDM and participants are invited to submit photos and videos that tell an interesting story about the CDM. The International Photo Contest is open to all photographers, and submitted photos should showcase CDM projects or their related benefits and should contribute to knowledge about the value of the CDM. The winning entries will be displayed at UNFCCC COP 15 in Copenhagen in December 2009, and will also feature prominently on the UNFCCC/CDM website (http://cdm.unfccc.int/contest/ index.html).

#### **▶ SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT**

#### UNDESA AND DSD PARTICIPATE IN ENERGY, ELECTRIFICATION AND GREEN ECONOMY MEETINGS

The UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA) and its Division for Sustainable Development (DSD) have recently participated in a number of fora and workshops. DSD Director Tariq Banuri discussed the challenge of energy access in his closing remarks to the World Energy Forum, which convened at UN Headquarters in New York, US, from 31 August-1 September 2009 (http://www.un.org/esa/dsd/dsd\_aofw\_ene/ene\_pdfs/TheChallengeofEnergyAccessWorldEnergyConference09.pdf).

UNDESA, along with the Global Environment Facility, UN Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, and the e8, contributed to "Financing Sustainable Electrifi-

cation – South and South-East Asia Dialogues," which took place from 8-10 September 2009, in Bangkok, Thailand, and served as the first of a series of region-specific workshops to be convened in the coming four years to share experiences and sector-specific expertise related to financing of sustainable electrification projects and the deployment of low-emitting power technologies in developing and emerging countries (http://www.e8.org/index.jsp?numPage=222).

UNDESA co-hosted the Green Korea Conference, which convened on 9 September 2009, Seoul, Republic of Korea, and brought together representatives from government and industry to discuss policy recommendations on is-

sues including energy policy, environmental industry, land-use and transportation policy, legislative issues, R&D strategy, and agricultural and maritime policy (http://greenkorea2009.org/eng/01\_overview/02\_overview.php?P HPSESSID=6eadb5ece373ff939bcd2dd902da46fc; http://www.un.org/esa//desa/ousg/statements/2009/20090909\_green\_Korea.html).

In regard to the 18th session of the Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD 18), for which the DSD serves as Secretariat, the third draft of the 10 year Framework of Programmes for Sustainable Consumption and Production is available for public comment (http://esa.un.org/marrakechprocess/draft10YFPInput.shtml). #### **CBD SECRETARIAT** STRENGTHENS COOPERATION WITH UNEP-WCMC, UNWTO

The Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) and the World Conservation Monitoring Centre of the UN Environment Programme (UNEP-WCMC) signed a Memorandum of Cooperation that sets out a work programme of cooperation between the CBD and UNEP-WCMC. The multi-year programme of work builds on an agreement established in March 2006, on the existing collaboration between UNEP-WCMC and the CBD Secretariat and Parties, in order to bring the technical and capacity-building expertise within UNEP-WCMC to bear on the improved implementation of the Convention and enhance the preparation of the tenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to be held from 19-29 October 2010, in Nagoya, Japan (http://www.cbd.int/doc/ press/2009/pr-2009-09-03-wcmc-en.

On the margins of the third World Climate Conference, the CBD Secretariat signed a Memorandum of Cooperation with the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO), aiming to raise public awareness of the

inter-relationship between biodiversity and tourism. Both parties will work towards maximizing tourism's positive contribution to conserving biodiversity and enhancing the quality of life of lopeople (http://www.cbd.int/doc/ press/2009/pr-2009-09-04-unwto-en. pdf).

In other CBD news, the Secretariat has finalized the logo for the celebration of the International Year of Biodiversity 2010. The logo was officially unveiled on 8 September 2009 in Strömstad, Sweden, at the occasion of the EU meeting "Visions for biodiversity beyond 2010 - people, ecosystem services, and climate crisis," convened with the participation of the COP 9 Bu-

#### **EUROBATS SECRETARIAT** PUBLISHES LEAFLET ON BATS AND FORESTRY

The Secretariat of the Agreement on the Conservation of Populations of European Bats (EUROBATS), developed under the auspices of the Convention on Migratory Species (CMS), has recently published a new leaflet on "Bats and Forestry," providing high-level guidelines for bat-friendly forestry (http:// www.eurobats.org/publications/leaflet/ BatsForestry\_Flyer\_web\_e.pdf).

#### ▶ CHEMICALS AND WASTES

#### **UNEP MERCURY PROGRAMME** RELEASES OEWG DOCUMENTS

The UNEP Mercury Programme has released documents for the upcoming Open-Ended Working Group on Mercury (OEWG), to prepare for the intergovernmental negotiating committee (INC) on mercury scheduled to convene from 19-23 October 2009, in Bangkok, Thailand. Documents posted include: the provisional agenda; a scenario note for the OEWG to prepare for the INC on mercury; and a document on consideration of the rules of procedure for the INC (http://www. chem.unep.ch/MERCURY/WGprep.1/ Documents.htm).

#### BASEL SECRETARIAT REQUESTS INFORMATION

The Basel Secretariat has requested parties to provide information on wastes other than those listed in Annex I or Annex II of the Convention, that are defined as, or are considered, hazardous waste by national legislation, in accordance with Article 3 of the Convention. The Secretariat will make this information available on its website (http://www.basel.int/convention/ communications/25-08-2009-Art-3. pdf).

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE STOCKHOLM CONVENTION DEPOSITED

The amendments to the Stockholm Convention, agreed by parties to the Convention at the Fourth Conference of the Parties (COP-4) in May 2009, have been deposited. The adoption of the amendment to Annexes A, B

and C of the Stockholm Convention. was communicated by the Depository on 26 August 2009. Accordingly, the amendments shall enter into force on 26 August 2010 for all parties that have not submitted a notification in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 3(b) of Article 22 (http://chm. pops.int/).

#### ▶ TRADE, FINANCE AND INVESTMENT
